PK & KG1

CURRICULUM AND GRADUATION STANDARDS

Grading Scale

AP courses are considered the most rigorous, college-level coursework within the American curriculum. Please note that there is no additional weighting for these courses.

Minimum Graduation Requirements

At GAAQ, a minimum of 24 credits are required for graduation. One credit (1.0) is awarded for the successful completion of each full year course with a minimum mark of "D" or 60%. Students enroll in courses according to graduation requirements, abilities, interests and previous education experience. Every student who fulfills minimum graduation requirements will be eligible to graduate from GAAQ with an American High School diploma.

■ THE AMERICAN CURRICULUM AT GAAQ

PK & KG1

The PK and KG1 classroom environments are designed with learning through play. With the play-based learning centers, students engage with their peers to learn skills in four main categories: social/emotional, physical, cognitive and language development. The social/emotional stage helps promote independence, self-confidence and self-control. Through various centers such as dramatic play, block building, toys and games, art, looking at books and drawing/writing, sand and water play and discovery tables, students get to interact with each other practicing social skills and emotional regulation. Our teachers are guides and coaches before, during and after social encounters so that students can gain skills that will benefit them along their learning journey. We know that when students have key social emotional skills, they are better prepared for academic learning in elementary school.

KG2

In our KG2 classrooms, we begin academic skill building through the introduction of our programs - Readers Workshop, Writers Workshop and Everyday Mathematics. These programs allow hands-on learning which builds upon student independence and engagement in learning. Readers Workshop begins with students learning letter sounds, 'snap' words that appear in predictable text, reading pictures and retelling simple stories Then, we progress to blending letters sounds to make words, matching pictures with the words on the page and decoding text. In Writers Workshop, we begin with student drawing and telling the story they have created, using inventive spelling to label pictures they have drawn. Next, we move on to touching and telling the story they want to write, understanding that each word has a place on the paper. Students also practice stretch words to hear each sound of the word which eventually advances to traditional spelling through Grade One. In Everyday Math, students play many games and use manipulatives to have hands-on experiences with objects that they sort, count, bundle, understand patterns and implement basic geometry.
Students build number sense through 20 and can count to 100.
Math concepts are learned through experiences and play. All the while, teachers are continuing to work with students to develop learning behaviors that will serve them when they walk up the stairs for the first time to Grade 1.

ELEMENTARY SCHOOL (Grades 1 - 5)

Our approach, which is centered on developing the whole child, includes a rich diversity of academics, language, physical education, fine arts and music education. The GAAQ community developed the core values which focus on competencies that students will use their entire lives (leadership, respect, innovation, purpose and tenacity). These values are woven seamlessly into daily learning. We strive to use a cross-curricular approach called Problem-Based Learning

(PBL); this allows students to learn concepts, content and skills while applying them to real-world situations.

GAAQ's elementary students experience the American Common Core standards-based curriculum which is full of choice and opportunities for students to explore while developing academic skills. We count on teachers to provide highly-engaging cross-curricular lessons that promote the love for learning and challenge students to take risks and learn from mistakes.

MIDDLE SCHOOL (Grades 6 - 8)

GAAQ follows the American Common Core Standards and students experience the full breadth of academic offerings in math, English, social studies and science taught by a team of teachers who are solely dedicated to working with students in middle grades. We utilize College Board's Springboard curriculum which directly aligns to the rigorous standards of Common Core and challenges students to develop independent thought and to think critically and creatively. This comprehensive curriculum lays the foundation for students to successfully take on more specialized course work in grades 9-12, including a wide range of Advanced Placement (AP) courses.

We pride ourselves on the cultural diversity of the school as this is reflected in the language program. Our middle school students are able to study French or Spanish as a foriegn language, preparing them for the requirements of high school, and helping them become knowledgeable global citizens. We are also very proud of our high-performing Arabic team, who are consistently lauded with praise from the Ministry of Education of Qatar.

Arts and athletics are also an important part of the middle school program at GAAQ. These elective courses allow students to explore different areas of their choosing. From team sports in Physical Education, learning to play an instrument in band, coding in IT, drawing and painting in Visual Arts and performing a monologue in Drama, our middle students are offered a well-rounded and exciting educational experience.

At GAAQ we believe in teaching the whole child. Our Student Support team works tirelessly to ensure all students receive the individualized attention they need to be successful. Our burgeoning advisory program, and dedicated middle school counselor, directly address the social-emotional needs specific to young people in grades six through eight. We work closely with the 5th grade team to ensure that students are ready for the new challenges they'll experience in grade 6. Middle school is a crucial transition period for students between primary and high school where they grow from children to young adults and we recognize that that process can sometimes be difficult to

navigate. We're here to help along that journey, teach students the skills they will need going forward, and have some fun along the way.

The middle school at GEMS American Academy Qatar provides an enriching, nurturing and challenging environment for young people to explore who they are and grow into young adults equipped with the knowledge and skills to do great things.

HIGH SCHOOL (Grades 9 - 12)

With a focus on Common Core standards throughout our core subjects, we offer a true American Curriculum that will help our students be successful in the future. Common Core aims to develop a student's critical-thinking, problem-solving, and analytical skills. Our curriculum is vertically- and horizontally-aligned so that students have the requisite skills and information necessary as they progress through each grade level. With unique opportunities in a wide array of school clubs and after school activities at no-cost to families, our school has grown into a safe, secure learning environment where students feel challenged and respected to grow holistically.

In Grades 9 - 12, we offer College Board's rigorous Advanced Placement (or AP Program) with approximately 14 - 18 AP courses offered each year. This program affords students the opportunity to take college-level courses while earning college and university credits while in high school. These courses are more difficult than regular high school classes and also require students to pass AP exams at the end of the year to obtain this college credit.

In addition, we offer the College Board's AP Capstone Diploma which is based on two year-long AP courses: AP Seminar and AP Research. These courses develop skills in research, analysis, evidence-based arguments, collaboration, writing and presenting. We have a cohort of AP Capstone Diploma students which speak volumes about our hardworking student body and passionate teachers. Still, Advanced Placement courses are optional, so our high school students can take all regular classes and still graduate with the highly-regarded American diploma, as well.

Even though the majority of our educators are from the United States and Canada, we still possess a diverse multicultural population at the school with over 70 nationalities and over 15 teacher nationalities. This is an unique attribute that allows our community to respect each other's cultures and learn from each other in a setting that actively promotes respect and tolerance for all. Graduates of GEMS American Academy Qatar are true indicators of this structure as we have students enrolled in reputable and esteemed colleges and universities all across the world.
